

Cairn Health—Does Your Dog Need Fatty Acids?

Just like with humans, good fatty acids are necessary nutrients for dogs' bodies. They're part of cell walls and help pets have a healthy coat and skin. Vitamins, minerals and protein are as important to the dog's health as fatty acids are to the coat and skin.

While fatty acids are important supplements for healthy dogs, in large amounts, they also contribute to natural treatment for a variety of medical conditions. They reduce inflammation for dogs with allergies, arthritis, auto-immune disorders, even kidney disease, asthma, heart disease, digestive problems, and seborrhea the skin disease. Or, increasing inflammation, they are useful for dogs that have infections and still need vital fatty acids for good healthy skin and coat.

There are two major types of fatty acids: Omega-6 and Omega-3. These names refer to the nutrients' chemical structure. In general, omega-6 will help to promote inflammation whereas omega-3 fatty acids combat inflammation.

Omega-6 is found in vegetable oils such as flaxseed, soybean, sunflower, safflower, corn oil and in pork and poultry fat. Fortified flaxseed oil has higher levels of omega-6 but is low in

saturated fats so it is considered optimal.

Almost all manufactures include omega-6 in dog and cat food kibble but, there will not be the same amount of omega-3 in the kibble due to the temperatures of the processing. Also, since omega-3 is much more expensive than omega-6, the ratio of omega-6 to omega-3 will usually be between 5:1 to 10:1. So if your pet has conditions where he or she needs more fatty acids then he would more than likely take a higher dose of omega-3 to help with his illnesses. So the goal is to add omega-3 fatty acids to the dogs diet and minimize the omega-6 fatty acids. Meaning if you are feeding kibble, then an extra amount of omega-3 can be added to his bowl, even two to three times the amount on the label.

Omega-3 comes from several plants, such as flax, hemp, even some cold water fish, such as herring, salmon, sardines, mackerel and menhaden. Beware, if you decide to use cod-liver oil, that it contains higher concentrations of vitamin A and D which can be harmful to the liver, if the kibble you feed already has a "standard amount needed" level of A and D. However, your veterinarian will probably recommend fatty acids that comes from fish. This is because the fatty acids con-

tained in flaxseed oil may not be efficiently converted to the active forms needed by sick animals. Flaxseed oil is fine, though, for healthy dogs that are just taking fatty acids for healthy skin and coats. Chia seeds are also a source of omega-3 fatty acid, even more than flax seed, along with fiber, calcium and antioxidants

There is clinical evidence that omega-3 fatty acid docosahexaenoic acid (DHA) along with eicosapentaenoic acid (EPA) can also help to improve a dog's immunity, metabolism and overall general health. In recent tests, omega-3 fatty acids also have been shown to increase longevity in dogs with some types of cancer; this may be because omega-3 fatty acids can promote weight gain.

Because the nutrients reduce inflammation, the older dog that has deficiencies or the commonly found conditions of arthritis, heart disease and kidney or liver problems, even cancer, can benefit from omega-3 fatty acids. The catch with fatty acids is that it takes a high dose to help dogs with illnesses. That's why many doctors recommend giving dogs two to four times the dose that the label recommends. If one is giving a dog fatty acids simply for overall health, rather than to treat a specific disease, the dose on the label is probably enough.


